Updated syllabi of different subjects, Regulations for M.Phil., Ph.D., D.Sc. and D. Litt. are shown in the academic part of the University website. Admission notification giving number of vacancies in different departments, eligibility criteria, and reservations is indicated in the admission portal. 4. E tender for purchase of equipment, salary bill preparation, disbursement of salaries and pensions to employees and daytoday works of accounts section are performed online. 5. Undergraduate (UG) Postgraduate (PG) examinations are done as per rules and guidelines of UGC State Government. Paper setters, Moderators, Examiners lists are finalized in the meeting of the Board of Studies (UG or PG). Review of answer scripts for the aggrieved students is allowed. Entire system is transparent. 6. In the Central Library, book accession, lending and collection of books are computerized. Checking of plagiarism for research papers and thesis are done in the central library using Turnitin software. 7. IQAC meeting, meeting for preparation of AQAR are held periodically. For AQAR preparation, feedback from the departments is collected in the prescribed format online. 8. To carry out research programmes, UGC Regulation Guidelines are followed. One University Research Scholar is allotted to every faculty member each and the selection is made through a meeting of the DRC of the respective department. The progress report of all research fellows is examined by a committee formed by University authority. Research proposals are scrutinized and evaluated by an expert committee with the Dean of the respective faculty as Chairman.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Each Academic Department of the University takes special care for mentoring their students which is a continuous process. It includes (a) special care for those who are relatively weak in academic sense by counselling them, (b) allotting extra time for the students beyond usual class time to address their queries, (c) suggesting the students regarding their future career prospects after the end of their University lives according their merit and (d) also, inducing some of them who are little above the average for research work in future. In some Departments like Library and Information science students from 3rd semester are allotted respective supervisors for completion of the guided research work to be submitted at the end of the 4th semester. In Education Department there is allotment of dissertation mentor in the fourth semester and also, internship of B.Ed. and M.Ed. under mentor of different pedagogy subject. The mentors in some Departments are directly interacting with the students for their academic and professional development in terms of tutorial classes, educational tour for industrial and environmental exposure. The courses offered by the Departments help the aspirant graduates in getting a broad based knowledge about theoretical and applied aspects of different disciplines in general and its frontier areas in particular. The courses in some Science Departments include inter-alia, collaborative efforts with different institutes, industries, clinical laboratories and other agencies. Hence, the post-graduate or Ph.D. courses may open multi-channel opportunity of employment and entrepreneurship. The interdisciplinary nature of research in many science departments is reflected in the faculty members, who have shown their collaborative approaches with the other laboratories both at National and International levels (University of Calcutta, Bose Institute, IISER-Kolkata, IIT Kharagpur, Bidhan Chandra Krishi Viswavidyalaya, Central Inland Fishery Research Institute, Tripura University, WB State University, Chittaranjan National Cancer Institute, Nagoya University, Fukuoka Institute of Technology). In some Social Science Departments mentors meet their students and guide them with their studies and extracurricular activities. As in many social science departments a great majority of the students admitted are often first-generation learners, additional attention is devoted to them at all times. To observe the students individually, students are divided in groups. Teacher always advises them to read the required books so that they can better adapt to their discipline. In Visual Arts Department besides the normal class routine schedule the teachers interact with the students through group discussions and assessment, and also organize individual interactive session with the students. Within these sessions the field investigations are also seen and displayed for further proposals. In Zoology, for example, the

departmental library with 10 high end computers with internet and LAN, practical rooms, sophisticated laboratories for different fields of research animal house, microscope room with stereo zoom, dedicated cold room and tissue culture room, instrument rooms with UV VIS spectrophotometer, atomic absorption spectrophotometer, RT PCR, cold and micro centrifuge, GEL electrophoresis apparatus, Gel Doc, UV transilluminator, Freezers (-80°C, -20°C) facilities help the students in acquiring academic skill necessary for their future prospect.

Curriculum Development	Curriculum is designed to run the higher education for the betterment of the society. The programmes are structured to provide a solid basis in Science, Humanities, Engineering, Management, Commerce Education. Major revisions of the curriculum take place after three years in the light of Regulations institutional requirements. New Centres are established with inter-disciplinary subjects. New CBCS syllabi have been introduced in the Under Graduate (UG) Post Graduate (PG) courses after thorough discussion in Board of Studies (UG PG) meetings. The department of Statistics offers integrated program (B.Sc. M.Sc.). Department of Geography has very well-connected GIS programmes with current issues like water management. Skill development courses are introduced in the UG level. Project work dissertation have been made compulsory in the PG level to generate an aptitude of research among the students.

The evaluation is based on written examination, internal assessment, project papers including viva-voce examination. Human Resource Management

The employees of the University are posted at various posts depending on their specialization, experience and functional requirements of the University. The employees without computer knowledge are trained in the CIRM for office work using computers. Technical staff working in the laboratories are given periodical training either within the University or in the workshops on maintenance and repairing outside the University.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The departments of Engineering and Technology, Business Administration and Management, and Computer Science and Engineering regularly interact with industrial personnel. A lot of departments have several collaborative initiatives with various other Universities Institutions. Regular Industry visits, Guest Lectures are carried out.

Admission of Students

Till now, hybrid model (admixture of online and offline methods) of admission process is followed for Post Graduate (PG) admission to different subjects. Advertisement for admission to PG Courses are widely published in the University Website and National newspapers. Advertisement contains minimum qualification, fee's structure and the deadlines. Syllabus for different subjects is displayed in the University website. Application forms can be downloaded from the websites. This has reduced time consumption and manual workload. However, application forms are received and verified manually to prepare the merit list. 60 percent seats are reserved for the home university students and 40 percent seats are for the students of other Universities. An entrance examination (Multiple Choice type) is held for students of other Universities and a merit list is prepared based on entrance examination marks plus Under Graduate (UG) Honours marks. The whole process is transparent and status of all applicants are displayed on the University website. Admissions to UG

courses in different degree colleges affiliated to the University are completed by the respective colleges in a transparent manner. Government reservation policy is strictly maintained.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Green campus initiatives with focus on biodiversity conservation: The University promotes the maintenance and sustenance of the natural greenery and inherent biodiversity of the campus. The major trees, shrubs and herbs in the University campus and surrounding have been surveyed and documented. The University has also established a Butterfly Garden and a Herbal Garden within its campus with funds from West Bengal Biodiversity Board, Govt. of West Bengal and Ministry of AYUSH, Govt. of India (Fig.1). The garden houses more than 80 different varieties of medicinal plants, many of them rare and threatened and many that are commonly found in the Gangetic plains of Nadia and Murshidabad districts (Fig.2). The campus has documented bird visitors of about 83 numbers, 49 butterfly visitors, 10 mammals, about 16 reptiles and 8 amphibians (Fig.3). The University strives to maintain its inherent biodiversity and create habitat for more of such flora and fauna.

Green campus initiatives with focus on energy conservation: The University is making conscious effort for energy conservation. All the stake holders are being educated to switch off electric points whenever the utility of the point is not absolutely necessary. Everyone is advised to switch off the computer when not in use. The university is switching over to low power consuming lamps like CFL lamps and LED lamps as far as practicable. The University has also planned to use renewable source of energy especially solar energy for some of its lighting and heating requirements and plans to switch to solar energy sources in a big way in near future. The Ecopark is already lighted with solar energy.

Water harvesting: The University also has making conscious effort for water conservation. There are some rainwater harvesting and natural recharges of groundwater ponds established in the university campus.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Title of the Practice Number I: Establishment of an Arboretum and a Biodiversity Park in the University of Kalyani as an Extension of the

previously formed Herbal and Butterfly Garden 2. Objective of the Practice i. The primary objective behind the opening of an arboretum and biodiversity park was to have an innovative yet sustainable approach towards green environment with the reference to conservation of biodiversity of an area. ii. To have a place in the University where not only the rare species of plants will be conserved, to maintain a genetic stock of the same and create a database on the flora and fauna available so that the students can study and make observations on interactions between different species. iii. To have the nature reserve for the conservation of natural heritage in the area. 3. The Context: The idea behind having an Arboretum and Biodiversity is to promote biodiversity conservation and research in the University. 1. The Practice: Establishment of an Arboretum in the Biodiversity Park initiated by Biodiversity Working Group in 2018-2019 continued in 2019-2020 with an increased area of the Herbal and Butterfly Garden of the University of Kalyani. The grants received from the Ministry of Ayush, Govt. of India and West Bengal Biodiversity Board were put into use. The expanded area of the Herbal and Butterfly Garden was further made into a Biodiversity Park of the University. Various programmes were undertaken by the Department of Botany and the Department of Zoology to increase awareness among students and teachers about the importance of biodiversity. After the establishment of the Biodiversity Park efforts have been taken by the Department of Botany to organize several plantation programmes in the part and have various certificate courses where the study area would be the biodiversity park. Forest Department, Govt of India has also donated various saplings for the park (Fig. 1, Fig.2). 4. Evidence of Success: The park has received central funding from the Ministry of Ayush, Govt. of India for its upkeep and maintenance. It has also received funding from the Biodiversity Board, Govt. of West Bengal. Moreover, the park receives active help from the Forest Department in the plantation programmes arranged. The park now is growing various plants which can be procured by the 5. Problems Encountered: The Biodiversity Park, University of Kalyani is a huge area which requires strict upkeep. The present funding from Ministry of Ayush and the Biodiversity Board, Govt. of West Bengal is helping in the maintenance but to maintain a genetic stock and to achieve all the objectives behind opening this park, many more fundings are needed. Also, the Park is trying to generate revenue and the University plans to open up some activities in the park that might generate revenues in the future. 1. Title of the Practice 2: NNS Activities in the University and beyond the Campus for the Local People of Nadia and Murshidabad District 2. Objectives: i. To increase the extension programmes from the University of Kalyani ii. Have extension activities with Government Organisations, Non-Government Organisations and programmes such as Swachh Bharat, Aids Awareness, Gender Issue, etc. during the year 2019-2020. iii. To make the rural people of Murshidabad and Nadia aware about cleanness specially during covid-19 times and make the female careful about their reproductive Health in general. 2. The Context: University NSS unit is actually involved in various extension programmes that are associated with the improvement of socio-economic conditions, health conditions of the people living in the districts of Nadia and Murshidabad. 3. The Practice: The NSS unit from the University of Kalyani is associated with various awareness programmes under the leadership of NSS coordinator of University of Kalyani. The NSS unit of the University is actively associated with the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan where approximately 5400 students of our university joined the cleaning drive in the campus and in Kalyani township. The NSS unit also organized AIDS Awareness Camp in rural areas to make people aware of the disease and help them get rid of the taboo associated with AIDS. During the outbreak of COVID-19, in the month of March, 2020, when there was a scarcity of sanitizers, the NSS unit of Kalyani University took the initiative of distributing sanitizers that were made by various science department of University of Kalyani. They also extended their help to the Hospitals in Nadia and Murshidabad districts who were working with

COVID-19 cases at that time. Also, the NSS unit of the University of Kalyani visited various old age homes and Municipality in Nadia distributing sanitizers. The unit is also closely associated with spreading awareness by conducting World Drama Day Seminar in the year 2019 where almost 250 students joined the programme (Fig. 3, Fig. 4, Fig. 5, Fig. 6). Prof. Sukhen Biswas was also awarded the Best Programme Co-ordinator of NSS in West Bengal by the Government of West Bengal, Belur, Howrah by the Higher Education Department of the Govt. of West Bengal. But the programme coordinators of the NSS unit of the University and the affiliated colleges have to some extent have overcome the problems faced by the students participating.

Considering these aspects, the University has taken the following initiatives: (i) In the University, an atmosphere of communal harmony is preserved promoting the ideas of secularism, national integration and scientific outlook have been promoted with care. (ii) Considering the location of the University, students of all religions are admitted here and they promote maintain a sense of communal harmony. (iii) Interdisciplinary subjects are introduced for teaching and research to ensure completeness of knowledge. (iv) The decisions regarding Syllabus review upgradation, method of evaluation, compulsory coursework for Ph.D. students, are taken by the teachers themselves. (v) Admission to Ph.D. course is made through an entrance examination viva voce of the qualified students. (vi) There

are provisions for different scholarships for students. Students, as well as faculty members get financial support for field work in some subjects. (vii) The University has signed Memoranda of Understanding (MoU) with a large number of National/International Institutions. (viii) The departments of Microbiology, Molecular Biology Biotechnology have been organizing Entrance Examinations for admission to PG courses.

To enhance the research outcome: Yearlong activities will be undertaken for general and specific awareness among teachers, research students to encourage them publication in high quality research journals to enhance the visibility and accessibility to the research community. 6. To explore Collaborative Research Programmes with some of the prestigious Research Institutes within India.
